## Regulations for Exhibitors

1. Adult exhibitors must reside, work or be a member of a club in **Stokeinteignhead, Combeinteignhead, Hacombe or Maidencombe** Parishes. Entries for the children's classes will also be accepted from children living outside the parish who have relatives living in the parish and from children who attend Stokeinteignhead School.
2. Entry Fee of 25p per exhibit, five entries for £1.00 for adults. Entries to Children's classes are free.
3. An entry form must be completed and handed in with fees by **no later than 5.00pm on Thursday 25th July 2024** to:

4. One entry per exhibitor per class. Unrestricted entries for children.
5. Exhibits in all classes must be the work of the exhibitor.
6. Exhibitors in the flower and floral art sections must provide their own containers.
7. All preserve labels should state type and date made.
8. The Committee will take every possible care of exhibits, but do not hold themselves responsible for any breakages or damage.
9. The Judge's decision will be final in all cases.
10. Entries to be staged on Saturday 27th July 2024 between 8.30am and 11.30am.  
Judging will take place at 12.00 noon.  
Awards will be presented at 4.15pm.  
Exhibits to be cleared by 5.15pm.

## Awards Schedule

Show trophies will be awarded to those exhibitors with the most points in Sections A, B, C, D and E (not including Heaviest, Largest, Longest) with a separate trophy for the winner of the Children's Classes, Photography Class, Family Class and Arts and Crafts.

Points awarded in each class will be:

1<sup>st</sup> place = 4 points; 2<sup>nd</sup> place = 2 points; 3<sup>rd</sup> place = 1 point.

Children aged 16 years and under will be awarded one point for each children's class that they enter.

## **Section A - Flowers: *Own vases to be used***

1. Dahlias 3 blooms decorative variety or varieties
2. Dahlia 1 specimen bloom
3. Rose 1 vase of any 3 blooms - large flower
4. Rose 1 specimen bloom
5. Rose Cluster flower 1 vase 3 stems (1 or more varieties)
6. Hydrangeas 1 head – Lace Cap
7. Hydrangeas 1 head – Mop Head
8. House plant in a pot not exceeding 20cm (8inches) diameter
9. Fuchsias 4 Heads on a board with stems in water (Double Flower)
10. Fuchsias 4 Heads on a board with stems in water (Single Flower)
11. Rudbeckia 3 stems – any variety
12. Sunflower 1 specimen
13. Delphinium 1 specimen
14. Sweetpeas 5 stems – any variety
15. Cactus *or* succulent in a pot (max. 8" pot)
16. Vase containing 3 of any one type of flower not from the list above
17. Bonsai any form
18. Begonia 1 in a pot (max. 10" pot)

## **Section B – Fruit and Vegetables**

19. French Beans 6 pods - displayed directly on table
20. Runner Beans 6 pods - as above
21. Broad Beans 6 pods – as above
22. Peas 5 pods – displayed on a plate
23. Mange Tout 5 pods – displayed on a plate
24. Onions 5 (must all be the same size, all large or all small)
25. Garlic 3 bulbs
26. Potatoes White, 5 any shape on a dish or plate
27. Potatoes Coloured, 5 any shape on a dish or plate
28. Beetroot 3 of any one variety
29. Courgettes 3 of any one variety (10 – 15cms in length)
30. Tomatoes 5 ordinary cultivars
31. Tomatoes 5 small fruited
32. Carrots 3 of any one variety - displayed directly on table
33. Cucumber 2 – displayed directly on table
34. Lettuce 1
35. Radish 5 – displayed on a plate, keep 1" of foliage on

- 36. Chard 5 displayed in glass of water
- 37. Any vegetable not listed above.  
(3 small specimens on a dish or plate; or 1 large specimen)
- 38. Herbs 3 stems of one variety displayed in water
- 39. Vase of Culinary Herbs 4 kinds, 1 stem of each variety
- 40. Raspberries 10 fruits displayed on a plate
- 41. Blueberries 6 fruits displayed on a plate.
- 42. Berries – any variety not from above. 6 fruits displayed on a plate.
- 43. Currants
- 44. Dessert Apples 3 of any one variety
- 45. Rhubarb 3 sticks with 3” of leaf
- 46. Plums 3 of any one variety
- 47. A plate of fruit 5 fruit of any kind not listed above.
- 48. Display of vegetables. 4 types of vegetable, 2 specimens of each variety. Space limited to 60cm x 60cm.

### **Just for Fun – Heaviest, Largest, Longest**

Entries in this section will **not** contribute to the overall points score; however, a prize will be awarded for the best exhibit in each category.

- 49. Heaviest Potato
- 50. Heaviest Onion
- 51. Longest Runner Bean
- 52. Largest Leaf
- 53. Longest Grass with flower head
- 54. Funniest looking fruit or vegetable

### **Section C – Floral Art**

An exhibit is composed of natural plant material with or without accessories contained within a specified space. No artificial plant material to be used unless otherwise stated.

- 55. Vase of mixed garden flowers
- 56. Miniature: A miniature arrangement displayed in a wine glass using fresh/dried plant material. The overall exhibit must not exceed 20cm diameter and 20cm high. No accessories to be used.

57. Summer Party: a table centre piece using fresh/dried ornamental grasses. Exhibit must not exceed 50cm wide, 50cm deep with height optional. No accessories allowed.
58. An Olympic Sport: displayed on an A4 size base. Height optional. Accessories may be used.
59. Your Favourite Book: using fresh plant material, not exceeding 50cm wide and 50cm deep. Height optional. Accessories may be used. Please include title of the book.

***Classes are the same for all ages. Please enter class number followed by Section Letter on the entry form.***

81. Upcycle a tin can and make it into a decorated pen holder.
82. Make a RNLI boat in any medium to celebrate 200 years of the RNLI.
83. 3 Jam tarts on a plate – any flavour jam.
84. Create a picture or character from your favourite film or book – any medium. Please label which film or book it is.
85. Make a diorama of your choice in a shoe box. Use your imagination, but it could be a farm, football stadium, tennis court, beach scene, classroom, garden, spaceship etc. There are so many options.

***A diorama is a replica scene, typically a three-dimensional full size or miniature. In our case, it will be a miniature one to fit a shoe box.***

## Section I - Photography

Each photograph (colour or black and white) must be un-mounted; no larger than A5 (148mm x 210mm) size; no elements from a second photograph to be incorporated; and will be displayed on a large screen held in place by pins.

**This year’s themes are:**

86. Anyone for tennis?
87. Having a laugh
88. Summer pollinators
89. The churches of St Andrew’s Stoke, All Saints Combe or St Blaise Hacombe, from a different or unusual angle.

## Section J – Family Class

90. Make a scarecrow between 3’ – 5’. Chairs will be provided for display.

**Section K – Arts and Crafts – all items must have been made within the previous 12 months**

91. An animal or bird made from any medium.
92. Handmade knitted or crocheted 'shoulder' bag. No larger than 30cm x 20cm.
93. A framed picture made of sea glass and/or pebbles. No larger than A4 size, 30cm x 20cm.
94. Transformation challenge – something new from something old.
95. Write a limerick (5 lines).
96. Make a pair of textile oven gloves.

**Please remember to make a separate note of the entries you are exhibiting for your own records.**



## Hints and Tips on presenting your exhibits

This is not an exhaustive list, but a few tips which may help when presenting your exhibits. It is difficult to always present entries that are perfect, but don't be put off as we are all "in the same boat".

**French/Runner Beans:** Fresh pods, straight and same length – leaving a portion of the stalk on each.

**Onions/Garlic:** Uniform well ripened bulbs; avoid over skinning; wash roots and trim, leaving some on. Leave 7cms of stalk and bend over and tie or whip.

**Potatoes:** Same size – free from skin blemishes – wash gently.

**Courgettes:** Young tender shapely and uniform. Can be displayed with or without flowers on.

**Rhubarb** – straight sticks with 3" of leaf.

**Tomatoes:** Aim for uniform firm set of fruit with small eyes and firm fresh calyces (the small leaf like bit where the stalk joins the fruit).

**Carrots:** Straight uniform size, washed carefully – leaving on approx. 6–7cms of stalk.

**Beetroot:** Pick roots of even size, 6 – 8cms across, leaving on the tap root and approx. 7cms of stalk.

**Fruit:** Always leave stalks on.

**Dahlias & Roses:** If one specimen bloom is required do not leave any buds on the stem, as these are also counted as blooms.

### **Jam/Marmalade & Jelly:**

**Jars** should be clean and well filled to about 3mm from the top.

**Covers** wax circle with cellophane outer cover or twist top, which should be plain – not a commercial lid when showing.

**Colour** should be even, bright and characteristic of fruit used – no scum, mould, sugar crystals or foreign bodies.

**Fruit** should be evenly distributed and tender.

**Consistency** should be jellified, not runny or sticky.

**Flavour** should be full, fresh and characteristic of the fruit used

### **Pickles & Chutney:**

**Jars** should be clean and filled to about ½ inch (12mm) from the top and labelled with contents and date of making.

**Tops** of jars must be vinegar resistant.
